Attractions at Charlevoix.

No resort in Northern Michigan offers attractions superior to those at Charlevoix. Although the engine's whistle and smoke do not yet disturb the peace of this sequestered spot, yet it is very easy of approach. The traveler, arriving weary and dust-enshrouded at Petoskey or Traverse City, can step on board one of the large Hannah, Lay & Co. steamers, or the graceful Friant, or the Lou Cummings, and enjoy the invigorating breezes of Lake Michigan, with nothing to remind him of the fatigue he has lately endured.

To one approaching the town of Charlevoix, an air of quiet is one of the most noticeable features. The noiseless glide of the steamer as she enters the village by its liquid highway, and the lazy swing of the draw-bridge, suggest a quiet sought in vain at some more fashionable resorts. And then the absence of the vociferous cab-men, fruit and news venders, boot-blacks and organ-grinders, confirm the impression that at last Elysium has been discovered.

However let no one suppose that Charlevoix is a "dead town," which can offer no attractions to the summer tourist. Its society comprises the representative families from all parts of Michigan and many of the principal cities of Ohio and Illinois. Many who are accustomed to spend the winter months in the Sunny South or Far West, most gladly turn their faces toward their cottages at Charlevoix with the return of summer's heat.

In another respect Charlevoix is surpassed by no northern resort; namely in its boating facilities. The waters of Round and Pine Lakes bathe the shores of the Resort grounds and offer a safe sporting place for children and those who wish to row or sail for pleasure; while the unbroken swell or tossing white-caps of Lake Michigan are within easy reach of those more skilled in the use of the oar and helm.

Again, Charlevoix is by no means behind her sister resorts in the inducements she can offer to those who love to sport with the finny tribe. The Jordan—a name well known to northern fishermen—is but a two hours ride by steamer from Charlevoix, at the opposite end of Pine Lake. Boats can be procured at Charlevoix, and guides who will pole the sportsman up the Jordan as far as he may wish to go. There he may find good accommodations for a night or longer, and by day have nothing to do but sit in his boat and "land" the "speckled beauties." Or several smaller streams are found nearer to the Resort grounds, where the timid trout may be taken by the skillful angler.

In a word, rest and recreation, social enjoyments, rowing, sailing and fishing are but part of the attractions which Charlevoix can offer to the prospective traveler.

"New Belvedere."

One of the chief attractions at Charlevoix, for 1887, will be the new Club House, of which more will be said in the following pages. The members of the Association are to be congratulated upon the fact that this long-felt want is now supplied.

However the attractions of Charlevoix need not to be recounted to the members of our Association. The fact that we look forward eagerly to each opening season is sufficient proof of the magnetic influence of the Resort over us. We would not look elsewhere if we could. But it is with the wish that many of our friends may join the charmed circle, that we have given this enumeration.

In closing, your Secretary desires to acknowledge his indebtedness to his predecessor, Mr. George E. Bardeen, for many valuable suggestions; to Mr. Edward F. Parmelee, of the *Sentinel*, for his kindly aid in gathering materials for this book; and to all the members of the Resort for the consideration they have shown to a novice.

Call for Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Charlevoix Summer RESORT ASSOCIATION will be held in Music Hall, on the grounds of the Charlevoix Summer Resort at nine o'clock a. m., Tuesday, July 19th, 1887, for the election of officers and directors, and for the transaction of any other business that may come before the meeting.

The new hotel has filled one aching void upon our grounds, but others remain. Attractive as our Resort is, we can make it more so. The proceeds of one or two entertainments in Music Hall are in the hands of the Treasurer, to be applied when a sufficient amount has been secured toward the improvment of one of our parks. We are glad to hear that steps have already been taken towards placing stationary lamps at the approaches to our terrace steps, and that a needed addition will be made to Music Hall. Cannot some action be taken at the annual meeting, with a view to the further improvement of the south half of our grounds. These lots should be cleared up and made more accessible, if we expect to find purchasers for them.

The reports of the Hotel and Building Committees will be awaited with unusual interest this year. These Committees have both had their hands full the past year in the planning and construction of the new hotel and providing for its management. We can all see how faithfully their work has been done. And since they receive and wish no other compensation, let us show by a large attendance at the annual meeting our appreciation of their services in our behalf.

Abstract of Report of Directors.

As the question of the permanency of our leases is one of interest to every lot holder, we subjoin the following outline of the report of the Directors on the "Legal Rights of Lease Holders," as rendered at the last annual meeting:

- 1. Any corporation in this State, whose existence is limited by the law under which it was organized, can renew its life by a simple vote of its members, and by complying with the same forms of law as when it became a corporation,—each stockholder being entitled to one vote only.
- 2. Many organizations are restricted by the terms under which they are incorporated, to an existence of thirty years, with liberty to renew their existence.
- 3. Many other organization are *not* thus restricted. The Charelevoix Summer Resort was incorporated under the provisions of Act. No. 122, of the year 1877, which places *no limitation* as to continued existence in the Associations which it incorporates.
- 4. We find in the laws relating to corporations in general, nothing which limits the existence of our Association, except that the State reserves to itself the right to annul our charter and dissolve our Association for cause. If, however, any provision of the constitution or any statutes of the State limit our existence to thirty years, it remains in the power of the majority of stockholders and lot holders to renew our charter.
- 5. Our Association can secure its own dissolution only by an appeal to some court of equity upon the vote of a majority of the Directors. The application for a hearing must be made at least three months before it can be granted, and a notice of the hearing with the reasons therefor must be published. After a due hearing, if the court finds that the dissolution will be beneficial to the stockholders, and not injurious to the public, a decree for dissolution must be granted.

In view of these facts we conclude that no lease holder can suffer from the danger of the dissolution of this Association.

If any lease holder desires any futher security, we recommend that on the payment of fifty dollars for each lot, a bond for a deed be given to any lot holder, the bond to be signed by the President and Secretary of the Association, and the deed to be delivered on the dissolution of the corporation.

Rail Road Accommodations for 1887.

In response to many inquiries already made, and in anticipation of many others, the Secretary begs leave to make the following statements:

The Grand Rapids & Indiana Rail Road Company, the Detroit, Lansing & Northern Co., and the Michigan Central Co., have granted the customary half-fare rate to members of our Association who live within the State. As to the place of residence they make the following express statement: "We are unable to extend the reduced rate to members residing outside of the State, as the business would come under the Inter-State Law, and we do not think its provisions will allow it. Tourist rates will, however, be in effect, open to all applicants, at all points on our line, which your members outside of the State can take advantage of. These rates are about one and one-third fare."

These roads will sell round trip tickets for one fare to members of our Resort, residing within the State, upon proper certificates, which may be obtained of the Secretary.

The above roads are the only ones which have thus far notified us that they would allow the customary rates to members of our Association.

Should any of our members be contemplating a lake trip for the summer, or be mentally adjusting the inequalities of the Inter-State Law, we take pleasure in directing their attention to the advertisements in the following pages of the two leading steamboat lines on the lakes. To those who would enjoy a water route, nothing could be more tempting than a trip to Macinac from Cleveland, Toledo, Detroit or Chicago, by one of these lines.

To those of our friends who are denied the customary railway accommodations, we commend this more comfortable way of reaching Charlevoix. The best of accommodations will be found on board these palace steamers. The Charlevoix Summer Resort now has a hotel of which it may well be proud. It contains about forty rooms, or twenty suits. These rooms may be used separately or thrown together. Double piazzas extend across the two wings of the house, both in front and rear, and each room has a door opening upon the piazza. There is little choice in the rooms, except as one may prefer the first or second story, as all the rooms are equally desirable. The rooms are good size, have high ceilings, good ventilation, are all plastered and furnished new throughout. Much pains has been taken by our hotel building committee to make these rooms attractive as well as comfortable. Such carpets and furniture have been selected as would make the rooms both bright and home like. Persons who desire may have fires in their rooms.

The office and parlor will be especially appreciated by those who like to have a cheerful place for a social chat. We are sure that those who stop at the Club House will not now have so frequent occasion to envy those who are snugly housed in cottages.

Furthermore, we are sure that the "inner" man will find no less cause for delight in the Club House. Its dining hall, with a seating capacity of three hundred, will be under the supervision of an expert in the art of gratifying the human taste.

With a new house, new furniture, and a close attention to the comfort of guests on the part of the hotel management, we predict a most enjoyable season to those who stop at the new hotel.

Board and rooms will be furnished at the Club House for \$2.00 and 2.50 per day, according to room, with a special rate to members for table board.



ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION.

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED, citizens of the United States, and of the State of Michigan, desiring to associate ourselves together under the provisions of Act number one hundred and twenty-two of the session laws of the State of Michigan, of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, do hereby certify in writing, that we have, by these presents, so associated ourselves together for that purpose; and we do hereby agree that the name and title of said association, shall be, "THE CHARLEVOIX SUMMER RESORT"; and that the particular business and object of such Association shall be to own and occupy, for purposes of recreation and health, a parcel of ground in the Town of Charlevoix, County of Charlevoix, and State of Michigan. And we agree that the number of directors to manage such Association shall be seven, and that the directors for the first year shall be H. W. Page, Sam'l. Brooks, J. L. Sebring, F. W. Willcox, S. A. Gibson, H. F. Weimer, and Willard Morse, Jr. Given under our hands and seals, this 21st day of May, A. D., 1878.

Charlevoix Summer Resort. BY-LAWS.

- 1. The officers of this Association shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, who, with five Directors, not officers, shall constitute 'the Board of Directors, and shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting, and each shall continue in office for one year from the first day of the following October, or until his successor has been elected and assumes the duties of his office.
- 2. When any vacancy shall occur among the officers or Directors, it shall be competent for the remaining members of the Board to fill such vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Association.
- 3. In case of failure, for any reason, to elect officers or Directors at the annual meeting, it shall be competent for any nine lot holders or stockholders to call a meeting, at which the members present may proceed to elect officers and Directors for the current year.
- 4. The annual meeting shall be held on the grounds of the Resort, on the third Tuesday in Julyjin each year, at

such a place as the Secretary may designate; and on application of any nine lot holders or stockholders, the Secretary shall call other meetings at such time and place as they may designate.

5. The Secretary shall mail a notice of every meeting to every stockholder, at least seven days before the time of such meeting.

6. Nine lot holders or stockholders shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.


7. Any person having the approval of the Board of Directors, may become a member of this Association by paying a membership fee of ten dollars.

8. Certificates of stock, signed by the President and Secretary of the Association may be issued to the members



of the Association to the amount of stock authorized by By-Law 21, each certificate to be paid for in the sum of ten dollars, and the holder and owner of such certificate shall be authorized to cast one vote for each share that he may own in all elections of Officers and Directors, and at all meetings of the Association, when any proposition is submitted for the purchase of additional land, or the sale of land owned by the Association, and such certificate may at any time be transferred by the owner, with the written approval of the Board of Directors, to any member, who shall have all the privileges of the party to whom the same was originally issued; but on all other questions each lot holder or stockholder has one vote only; and every lot holder who is not a stockholder shall be entitled to one vote in the election of Officers and Directors.

9. Each member of the Association may lease a lot at its appraised value, and no member shall hold more than one lot, except by special permit of the Board of Directors



and each member leasing a lot shall receive a certificate of lease signed by the President and Secretary of the Association, said lease to run during the existence of the Association and be subject to assessments and to such restrictions as are imposed by the Articles of Association, and the By-Laws; but the lease shall be forfeited if a building, such as the Directors shall approve, is not placed upon the lot within two years from the date of the lease.

10. Certificates of stock shall not be taxed, but lots only shall be subject to such assessments as the Association by its By-Laws or by special vote, may determine.

11. Every occupied or selected lot shall be subject to an annual assessment of not less than two dollars each, payable on the first Monday of May of each year, and a larger assessment shall not be made unless authorized by a vote of two-thirds of the lot holders of the Association present

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at the annual meeting or at a meeting called for the purpose, and in no case shall the assessment be more than five dollars each in any one year, for the first five years of the existence of the Association.

12. Any holder of a lot failing to pay any assessment for a period of thirty days after notice from the Secretary shall, unless otherwise determined by the Board of Directors, forfeit his lease.

13. The holder of a lot shall be at liberty at any time to sell, to a member of the Association, his building and other improvements, and his lease, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.



14. Any person owning a cottage may rent the same, with the approval of the Board of Directors, and the person so occupying it shall be subject to all the rules and regulations of the Association.

15. No holder of a lot shall deposit any garbage or offensive refuse upon any part of the grounds, or allow any such offensive matter to accumulate upon his own lot.

16. If any holder of a lot shall place upon it anything which shall be deemed improper or offensive by a majority of the Board of Directors, it shall be the duty of the Board to remove, or cause to be removed, such improper or offensive thing, and if any holder of a lot shall persist



in making such use of his lot as shall be deemed offensive by a majority of the Board, he shall forfeit his lease of the lot.

17. No intoxicating liquors shall be sold upon the premises, and any member of the Association who shall be guilty of selling such liquor upon the premises shall forfeit his membership in the same.

18. Any member not holding a lot, but wishing to erect a tent for a short time upon an unoccupied lot, may do so with the approval of the Board of Directors for the sum of two dollars for the season, payable in advance; but such occupancy shall cease whenever said lot shall have been selected and claimed by a member of the Association, and the owner of the tent shall in that case be allowed to erect his tent upon another unoccupied lot, without additional fee.





19. The Treasurer shall not be allowed to pay bills that may be presented, until they have been approved by a majority of the Board of Directors.

20. The Directors of this Association are forbidden to contract any debts, except under the instruction of the Association, by direct vote, for a specific purpose.

21. Common stock of the Association shall be limited to \$5,500 and preferred stock of the Association shall be limited to \$2,600.



The officers of this Association are authorized to issue preferred stock to the amount of \$2,600, which shall draw interest at the rate of seven per cent per annum, payable annually, said preferred stock to be subject to the right of the Association to call in and retire the same, or any portion thereof, by paying the sum for which it was issued, and all accrued interest.

23. At least one-half of the proceeds of the sale of lots shall be applied to retiring the preferred stock, until it is all taken up.

24. Any of the by-laws of this Association may be rescinded or altered, or a new by-law adopted, by a twothirds vote of the lot holders or stock holders present at any legal meeting.

In cases where the original share of stock is lost, and parties desire a duplicate, it is required that the party to whom the duplicate is issued give a bond of indemnity to the Association, and in case the party wishes to transfer the same, then each party shall file a bond with the Association.
