
The eighteen-hole course of the Charlevoix Golf Club is one of the best in the country, and its privileges may be enjoyed by Belvedere guests.

Hay-fever sufferers will here find instant relief. The dreaded "off-land" breeze is almost an impossibility as the grounds are nearly surrounded by water.



















In view of the splendid success attending the efforts of the Charlevoix Yacht Club during the season of 1912, the directors have felt justified in making more extensive plans for the summer of 1913, and the week of August 16 to 23 has been selected for the annual regatta on Pine Lake. No finer sailing grounds are to be found about the Great Lakes, and lovers of water sport are promised an enjoyable week.

The Club Championship Races are open to all yachts of Club members with the exception of sloops and catboats with a water line length of not more than 20 feet, and Mackinaws with a water line length of not more than 30 feet.

The second annual series of races for the Lord Cup will be sailed on the same dates as for the Club Championship Trophy.

The Belvedere Hotel Cup is a new trophy, and will be sailed for what is known as the Traverse Bay Championship. Competition for this cup will be open to entries from all Traverse Bay organizations, and will be sailed in three races, as follows: Wednesday morning, August 20; Thursday afternoon, August 21; and Saturday morning, August 23. This cup shall become the permanent property of the winner of the 1913 races.

The annual motor boat races shall be held on Saturday after-

noon.

SEASON NINETEEN HUNDRED AND THIRTEEN

THE Charlevoix Summer Home Association, at this time, is composed of ninety-six members, owners of summer homes, and equal owners of the property of the association.

Its officers and trustees serve without pay. Surplus earnings go into improvements. Dividends annually, in the form of pure air, recreation, and good health. Its thirty-three years of success is based upon:

First—Pure, bracing air at "Charlevoix, the Beautiful," where prevailing winds are from the west across 80 to 100 miles of the waters of Lake Michigan.

Second—Pure water, from its own artesian wells, with pumps and engines capable of delivering an ample supply, through storage tank and mains to The Belvedere and cottages, equipped with modern plumbing.

Third—Sanitary features, arising from its sewer system, with septic tank, constructed under plans and supervision supplied by Mr. George S. Pierson, Hydraulic and Sanitary Engineer, member of and Director in the American Society of Civil Engineers.

Fourth—Sanitary features, arising from rules requiring daily removal of garbage and other refuse. Occupants of cottages, whether owners or tenants, are required to pay the contractor for such services. Burning and burying garbage is strictly forbidden.

Fifth—Elimination of every form or individual or personal

interest not in harmony with the mutual or general interest of the members.

Sixth—Golf, tennis, boating, fishing, and an endless variety of innocent amusements for old and young, in a charming city of summer homes, where excursion crowds to mar our comfort and pleasure are unknown.

Seventh—Its Belvedere, a summer home for members of the Association, their families, guests, friends, and other desirable patrons. Admission to entertainment therein and use of tennis courts, is restricted to guests of The Belvedere, occupants of cottages upon Association grounds, members and special members, their families and guests, and guests invited by Manager and Mrs. Foley.

In the summer of 1909 additional land, lying along the west line of land owned by the Association, was purchased for the purpose of fully protecting the interest, comfort, and pleasure of its members and their families against any possible location of undesirable features near its water plant, cottages, and grounds. And for the further purpose of preventing any destruction of desirable native forest trees in which the Association and its members may be interested.

RESOLUTION

Passed at the Annual Meeting of the Charlevoix Summer Home Association on Aug. 4, A. D. 1908.

"Resolved, That on and after the expiration of the year A. D. 1908, no dog shall be kept, housed, or maintained on the grounds of this Association, or be permitted within the boundaries thereof, at any time, or for any period of time."

RESOLUTION

Passed by the Board of Trustees of the Charlevoix Summer Home Association, July 24, 1912.

"That a garbage tax be levied against the owner of each

and every cottage on the grounds of the Association, which shall cover the entire cost of carrying and disposing of the garbage accumulating at the cottages during the season, and to be operative at the beginning of the season of 1913. It is further ordered, that the Warden be authorized to accept bids for the work contemplated by this order, which tax shall be due and payable to the Association upon the opening of the cottage. It is further ordered that the Warden shall be charged with the duty and responsibility of collecting said tax.

Arrangements have been made in compliance with the above resolution for taking care of the garbage at the rate of \$2.50 per cottage, payable in advance, and bills will be sent by the Association about July 1st.

Water Plant

The Association has its own independent water plant, consisting of three deep artesian wells, engines and pumps, capable of furnishing two hundred gallons per minute, with which to supply The Belvedere and cottages with pure water. The fine quality of the water is beyond question, as the following analysis made by

Francis E. West, M. S., Professor of Chemistry at Alma College, Alma, Michigan, one of the most prominent chemists of the State, will show:



The excellence of the cuisine is a special feature. The local fruits and fresh vegetables with the sea foods from the nearby coast towns are freely used.


