




Lounge opening from lobby.




PENING from the lobby is a large, luxuriously furnished Solarium, overlooking the blue waters of Lake Charlevoix and the ever-changing scenes it presents.

THERE are eight fine, clay tennis courts in perfect condition for the free use of guests.


The country abounds in good roads and countless points of interest for motorists.


The many bridle paths through the woods and drives along the lake shores are the special delight of the equestrian. Good riding horses and instructors may be had at a moderate charge.

Boating on Lake Charlevoix with canoe, rowboat, sail boat or motor boat affords many hours of exhilarating pleasure.


